VOLUNTEENS SERVE OUR VETERANS

VolunTeen is a Legion Family term for anyone under age 18 who volunteers on behalf of a veteran, whether it's by reading books or helping with email correspondence for an elderly veteran, helping with activities



for military children, or making tray favors for hospitalized veterans. VolunTeens typically must be at least 15 years old to work in a VA Medical Center and at least 7 years old to work with a senior member in service outside a VA facility. The Auxiliary annually recognizes service hours reported to National Headquarters through an ALA department, whether the VolunTeen is a Junior Auxiliary member, a Sons of The American Legion member, or

honors their service commitments without benefit of membership in The American Legion Family.

Each VA Medical Center may nominate one Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service (VAVS) student



volunteer who has served 100 hours of regularly scheduled volunteer service to be considered for the annual James H. Parke Scholarship. To learn more about the generous Parke Scholarship, visit www.volunteer.va.gov.



LEGACY OF SERVICE

From World War I to today, committed, caring women have served America's veterans through the American Legion Auxiliary. Headquartered in Indianapolis, it is the largest women's patriotic service organization in the world and boasts a membership of nearly 800,000. With a presence in nearly 9,000 communities, its mission is to support The American Legion and honor the sacrifice of those who serve by enhancing the lives of our veterans, military, and their families, both at home and abroad, including volunteering nearly 1 million hours annually in VA Medical Centers-indeed, a proud legacy of service.

ALA GIRLS STATE/GIRLS NATION

Each summer, approximately 20,000 high school juniors across the country learn what it's like to live and breathe government. As an ALA Girls State "citizen," young women run for office to fill city and state



positions in their own miniature city, county and state governments. It is a fast-paced, interactive week of campaigning, debating current issues, voting, meeting state political figures, and just having fun with other girls who share a common interest.

From each ALA Girls State program, two delegates earn the right to participate in ALA Girls Nation in Washington, D.C. During that week, the "senators" learn about government on a national level, tour our nation's capital and meet leaders in various branches of government.

Both programs provide a week of living together with all the privileges, rights and responsibilities of American citizenship—one that is remembered for a lifetime. In fact, a

number of United States senators, representatives and other leaders of today developed an interest in government as a result of their involvement with ALA Girls State/Girls Nation.



SPIRIT OF YOUTH

Believing that education is a building block for freedom, the American Legion Auxiliary actively supports students who want to attend college. Since 1983, the Spirit of Youth and other Auxiliary programs have provided Junior Auxiliary members nearly \$1 million in scholarships. Helping young women determine their prospective career paths is an important component of ensuring their future success.
